The neighborhood of Haskoy in Istanbul is located on the northern bank of the Golden Horn. For 450 years this neighborhood was one of the important centers of Istanbul Jewry and was, in many ways, a *Jewish* quarter. The neighborhood cemetery was first opened in 1582, and is used for burial until recently. Most of those buried in this cemetery were Jews from the neighborhoods in the northern Golden Horn: Haskoy and Galata. Four hundred years of uninterrupted Jewish life are interred in the burial caves on the hillsides of Haskoy. There are near 22,000 graves in this cemetery.
